It sure is great to be able to get up and walk without thinking about it! But I do think about it once I am on my feet, and thank my Father often every day that He makes this possible. It has also made me more aware of the needs of those who cannot look forward to full health in this life.

One of the blessings of physical improvement is being able to travel. I reported to a church in the Philadelphia area at the beginning of July, and then drove to my sister's house in Lansing, Michigan, for a week of vacation. This time was a lot more fun than in December when I was still using a walker! We made lots of day trips, including a trip to the camp where my parents helped in the early 1960's during one of the work weeks in preparation for regular camp activities the following year. There have been many improvements, but the lake was much smaller than I remember it. Funny how our perspective changes as we grow up!

Earlier this month I put in a large order for medications and medical supplies. The workers reported that they needed batteries for flashlights and the blood pressure cuff, and I ordered a service kit for the main generator on the property. All of that, along with some important paper work for the clinic workers, was done after I returned from my sister's.

Isaac Paul had come to the US for a few weeks because he was concerned about personal threats. He had let me know that he was returning to Cap Haitien at the end of July, and we made arrangements for that trip. I was more comfortable sending everything in under his supervision.

Last Monday I drove to Ft. Pierce, Florida, to deliver the cargo to Missionary Flights. I saw Isaac on Tuesday morning, and we dealt with the matters relating to the workers. He commented on the sophisticated weapons that are in the country, as well as the fact that there are a lot of small arms, and many of them have silencers. We both wondered where all the money is coming for that stuff. The smaller weapons can be hidden easily, which means they can be spread widely. I returned to Greenville, South Carolina, on Tuesday, and took some time to rest after all the travels.

Thank You—For praying for my workers and the situation in Haiti. Several of my workers have told me how encouraged they are that you are praying for them.

—For praying for my safety on the roads. There were some high-speed drivers on the roads in just about every state where I traveled. And I do not think I am not the only one who has noticed that people are not using their turn signals, which makes it hard to know their intentions.

—For your faithful support which makes it possible for me to purchase medications and cover the salaries for the clinic workers. Because of you, these fellow believers are able to feed their families, cover the basics of life, and help others.

—For your prayers for me to have wisdom. In the next few days I am going to be contacting pastors about visiting their churches and giving an update report. I also plan to attend the annual meeting of Baptist World Mission in October. God has graciously given direction up to now, and I can trust Him for the future.
